

Y2 - Aut 2 – What makes a hero?



Impact

By the end of this unit children will...

Children in Year Two will develop a chronological understanding of significant individuals of the past, who they are and why they acted in the way they did. As they reflect upon what it is that makes someone a hero, they will come to understand that each person is given a mission by God, as St John Henry Newman said, "I am created to do something for which no one else is created; I have a place in God's counsels, in God's world, which no one else has". Each one of us is called to do good and to make this world a better place. Through their history and science lessons, Year Two will explore different individuals of the past and develop an understanding of why people acted in the way they did, how their actions have made the world a place "for the honour of God" (Vatican II). They will learn that through their actions, these significant individuals showed their responsibility in ensuring that all people live a life of dignity

Intent

Through the delivery of this unit of work children will develop an understanding of how significant individuals of the past were active members of society who exercised the rights and responsibilities and ensured that the rights of others in society were met.

Parables and Miracles:

Addition and Subtraction:

within 20).

To know number bonds to 10.
To know and use fact families (addition and subtraction bonds)

To use related facts.
To know number bonds to 100 (tens).
To add and subtract 1s.
To add by making 10.
Add three 1-digit numbers.
Add to the next 10 and add across a 10.
Subtract across a 10 and subtract from a 10.

Shape:

Recognise and sort 2D and 3D shapes.
Count sides and vertices on 2D shapes.
Draw 2D shapes.
Find lines of symmetry on shapes.
Make patterns with 2D and 3D shapes.

English

Traditional Tales - Children will read and explore the traditional tale 'Cinderella', children will retell the traditional tale.

Historical recount – Using the story 'Don't say no to Flo!' and 'Vlad and the Florence Nightingale Adventure', children will write in first person about this historical event.

Science

Uses of everyday materials:

The children will look at everyday materials including: 'wood', 'plastic', 'glass', 'brick', 'paper' and 'cardboard'. They will explore how objects made of some everyday materials can change shape and how the recycling process is able to reuse some everyday materials numerous times. They will also learn about new discoveries which have been made over time with a focus on John McAdam. The children will test and choose everyday materials to make an outfit for their hero.

Foundation Subjects

History and Geography

History

Florence Nightingale:

The children will learn about the influential nurses: Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell. They will establish what makes a person significant. They will explore and compare the lives and work of these nurses and consider how they have influenced nursing today.

Art and Design and Design Technology

Art – Sculptures

The children will explore how clay can be shaped with their hands, they will learn some basic skills that they then apply by making their own simple model. Practicing using the 'score and slip' clay joining technique, the children make their own pinch pot and decorate it by joining clay shapes. The children will experiment with working positively and negatively into a clay surface. They will then design and make a tile of their hero.

Computing

The programme Scratch will be explored and animations will be created.

Music

Musical Instruments - Storytelling

Dynamics and tempo will be explored. Soundscapes will be created linked to the traditional tale - Jack and the Beanstalk.

Physical Education

Net and Wall Games:

In this unit, children will develop their skills both individually and as part of a team. The children will use simple tactics in small-sided games.

Multi-Skills:

Children will learn to change speed when running and accelerate into space, whilst showing awareness of space and other individuals.

PHSE

The children will explore their relationship with others. They will build on the understanding that we have been created out of love and for love. This module explores how we take this calling into our family, friendships and relationships, and teaches strategies for developing healthy relationships and keeping safe.
